## **Designing Inclusive Posters**

## Poster Design

1. Contrast: Make important elements stand out from one another.

On your poster, this may look like:

- Varying text size (using a larger text size for your title and headings and using a smaller text size for your body paragraphs and captions)
- Using colours in strategic ways (using light text on dark backgrounds or dark text on light backgrounds)
- Using shapes (rectangles, circles) to help make information stand out
- 2. **Repetition**: Repeat visual elements so it feels like everything belongs together On your poster, this may look like:
  - Applying your design style for each section consistently across all sections
  - Using similar styles of graphics and images across the poster
  - Repeating the same colour palette
- 3. Alignment: Make sure every element on your poster lines up with another element.

On your poster, this may look like:

- Left-aligning the body text in each section (easiest to read)
- Left-aligning or center-aligning your headings, sub-headings, and images and repeating this consistently across your poster
- Making sure the edges of each section align with other sections, where applicable (look at the top edge, bottom edge, left side, and right side)
- 4. **Proximity**: Place related things close together, place non-related things farther apart.
  - On your poster, this may look like:
    - Placing captions near the images
    - $\circ$   $\;$  Increasing the space between sections to show they are separate

## Poster Accessibility

- 1. Font
  - Use one or a maximum of two typefaces (fonts)
    - i. An example of two typefaces is using a sans-serif font (e.g. Arial) for the title and headings and a serif font (e.g. Times New Roman) for body text

## 2. Colour

- Be sure colors have sufficient contrast between the foreground text and background.
  - i. Webaim Contrast Checker
- Do not use color alone to convey meaning. Relying on color alone to communicate information causes barriers for colorblind and low vision users.
  - i. In our bar chart example we used different patterns as well as color to relay information
- 3. Images
  - Be sure to use high quality images and place them in sequence of the text they are representing.
